# **About the Women's Peace and Humanitarian Fund (WPHF)**

- Multi-donor Trust Fund established in 2016 - a global partnership between UN agencies, Member States and civil society
- Funds local, grassroots women's civil society leaders, peacebuilders, WHRDs, and their organizations in conflict, postconflict and humanitarian settings
- Grants ranging between 2,500 to 200,000
   USD for a max of 24 months.
- Enable CSO partners to connect, strengthen their networks, share best practices, and develop their skills and capacity through a Global Learning Hub (L-Hub)





## **Building Community, Capacity & Knowledge Exchange for our Partners**

- Global Learning Hub (L-HUB) established in April 2020 to support WPHF CSO partners at the local level working at the forefront of conflict and crisis.
- Objectives: to enable CSO partners from across the world to connect, strengthen their networks, share best practices, and develop their skills and capacity.
- Key Initiatives: the Capacity Building Programme, the Peer Exchange Series, the Facebook Group and email monthly updates.
- Channels: digital repository of resources, email list and email monthly updates, and safe Facebook Group.







# **WPHF** in Nigeria

- Active since 2020
- Total investment: \$2.6 million USD

19 projects, implemented by 35 local women's rights civil society organizations.

- First Call for Proposals (2019):
- Spotlight Initiative Protection of Women and Girls (Impact 5)
  - 7 projects
- 3. COVID-19 Emergency Response Window (2020)
  - 2 projects
- 4. Second Call for Proposals (2021):
  - Forced Displacement Initiative Peacebuilding & Recovery (Impact 6) + Institutional Funding
  - 9 projects
- 5. Third Call for Proposals (2024):
  - Conflict Prevention and Peacebuilding (Impacts 2 & 6) + Institutional Funding

#### **WPHF's Impact Area 2 – Conflict Prevention:**

Increased meaningful participation and decisionmaking of women in conflict prevention processes and response

#### **WPHF's Impact Area 6 – Peacebuilding & Recovery:**

Improved socio-economic recovery and political participation of women and young women in peacebuilding contexts

#### Through:

- Programmatic funding, with grants ranging from USD 30,000 to 200,000.
- Institutional funding, with grants ranging from USD2,500 to 30,000.

## **Key Points to Keep in Mind**



- What is the geographic scope?
  - Nigeria: Adamawa, Benue, Borno, Cross River, and Yobe States (English proposals)
- What types of CSOs can apply? National, regional or local women's rights, women-led, youth-focused, young women-led and organizations working on gender equality with a proven track record on climate security.
- What about consortiums/partnerships? WPHF encourages partnerships between organizations. One CSO will apply as a lead, while others will be co-implementing partners.
- **What about legal registration?** Only the lead application needs to have a registration certificate. Co-implementing partners do not require to be registered.
- What is the budget?
  - Programmatic: Maximum of 200,000 USD. CSOs are not required to contribute.
  - > Institutional: Maximum of 30,000 USD. CSOs are not required to contribute

# **Key Points to Keep in Mind**



- What to expect in the selection process?
  - **Longlisting and Shortlisting.** The first stage of selection will determine if your application meets the minimum criteria. Applicants who meet the minimum requirements will proceed to next stage of technical review.
  - > Selection of the National Steering Committee (NSC). All shortlisted applicants are presented to the NSC who will review and endorse the selected applicants. The selected applicants will be notified of the selection as partners.
  - > Risk Assessment of the applicants. UN Women will conduct financial and technical assessments of selected applicants.
  - > Finalization of the proposal and budget. Parallel to risk assessment, UN Women will work with selected applicants to finalize their workplan and budget.
  - ➤ Entering into a partnership agreement. Once the workplan and budget are cleared, a partnership agreement will be entered between the partner and UN Women.
