

## **About the Women's Peace and Humanitarian Fund (WPHF)**

- Multi-donor Trust Fund established in 2016 - a global partnership between UN agencies, Member States and civil society
- Funds local, grassroots women's civil society leaders, peacebuilders, WHRDs, and their organizations in conflict, postconflict and humanitarian settings
- Grants typically range between 2,500 to 200,000 USD for a max of 24 months.
- Enable CSO partners to connect, strengthen their networks, share best practices, and develop their skills and capacity through a Global Learning Hub (L-Hub)

## **WPHF Funding Windows Overview**

#### **Regular Funding Cycle**

WPHF's largest funding mechanism, the Regular Funding Cycle, supports local women's civil society organizations by funding:

- Their programmatic work on women, peace and security and humanitarian action (max. USD 200,000), and
- Their organizations, through flexible institutional funding (max. USD 30,000)

Organizations can apply via country-based, time-bound Calls for Proposals.

#### Rapid Response Window for Women and Peace Processes

The Rapid Response Window (RRW) supports women peacebuilders and women's rights civil society organizations to enhance women's meaningful participation/influence in formal peace processes (Track 1 & 2) and the implementation of peace agreements, through:

- Direct logistical and/or technical support to individuals and CSOs (max. USD 25,000), and
- Small, short-term grants to CSOs for strategic and urgent interventions (max. USD 100,000)

Women peacebuilders and Women's rights CSOs can apply via a global application process on a rolling basis.

#### Window for Women Human Rights Defenders

The WPHF Funding Window for Women Human Rights Defenders supports **individuals** from/working in crisis and conflict affected countries who work for the promotion of human rights and inclusive peace, via:

- Advocacy Support (Direct logistical support) to influence decision-making events, and
- Safety Net (Flexible funding) to cover urgent safety and security needs of at risk WHRDs (max. USD 10,000)

WHRDs - individual & delegations can apply via a global application process on a rolling basis.


## **WPHF Global Learning Hub (L-HUB)**

- Global Learning Hub (L-HUB) established in April 2020 to support WPHF CSO partners at the local level working at the forefront of conflict and crisis.
- Objectives: to enable CSO partners from across the world to connect, strengthen their networks, share best practices, and develop their skills and capacity.
- Key Initiatives: the Capacity Building Programme, the Peer Exchange Series, the Facebook Group and email monthly updates.

## **WPHF Bangladesh Call for Proposals**



#### WPHF's Impact Area 2 – : Conflict Prevention

Increased meaningful participation and decision-making of women in conflict prevention processes and response

#### WPHF's Impact Area 6 – : Peacebuilding and Recovery

Improved socioeconomic recovery and political participation of women and young women.

#### Through:

- Programmatic funding, with grants ranging from USD 30,000 to 200,000.
- Institutional funding, with grants ranging from USD2,500 to 30,000

An organization (lead applicant or co-implementing partners) can submit one application for institutional funding, AND/OR one application for programmatic funding (for one of the two impact areas). Applications to more than one impact area will not be considered.

#### **Key Information:**

- Deadline for submitting applications: 27 July 2025
- Application package <u>MUST</u> include:
  - ✓ WPHF proposal template
  - Proof of valid legal registration or status of lead organization

# This Call for Proposals is linked to the WPHF Women and Climate Security Initiative.



✓ Impact Area 2: Conflict Prevention - Increased meaningful participation and decision-making of women in conflict prevention processes and response.

This includes activities that promote women's leadership and participation to inform decision making processes and responses related to the prevention of climate-related conflicts and injustice

✓ Impact Area 6: Peacebuilding & Recovery - Improved socio-economic recovery and political participation of women and young women in peacebuilding contexts.

This includes activities that promote women's leadership and participation to inform decision making processes and responses related to the prevention of climate-related conflicts and injustice

✓ Institutional Funding - Aims to reinforce the institutional capacity of women's rights/led organizations working on climate security and climate justice issues in peace and security and humanitarian contexts, to ensure they are able to sustain themselves and to improve their impact. Prospective applicants will need to demonstrate that the organization's mandate, mission or past activities includes a focus on climate security and climate justice issues.

## Key Points to Remember When Preparing Your Application



- Geographic scope: Bangladesh with a geographical focus only in: Cox's Bazar (Teknaf, Ukhiya and Cox's Bazar Sadar sub-districts), Bandarban, Bhola, Chattagram, Comilla, Feni, Jamalpur, Khulna, Kurigram, Noakhali, Satkhira, Sirajganj, Sunamganj, and Sylhet. Multi-country projects, or projects outside the geographical focus will NOT be accepted.
- **Timeline:** CSOs can apply for a project duration of maximum 2 years (24 months).
- > Type of CSO eligible to apply: National, regional or local/grassroots women or young women led, women's rights, youth rights, feminist, or civil society organizations with a proven track record working with women, young women and girls are eligible to apply.
- **Consortia/partnerships:** WPHF encourages partnerships between organizations. One CSO will apply as the main organization, while others will be implementing partners.
- **Legal registration:** Only the main applicant needs to submit proof of legal status in the country in which it was obtained.
- Maximum budget:
  - > \$200,000 for programmatic funding.
  - > \$30,000 for institutional funding.
- Language of application: English

## **Common Mistakes to Avoid**

#### How can I ensure my application is strong?



- Ensure the proposal is original and not plagiarized.
- Follow evaluation criteria outlined in section 8 of the terms of the Call for Proposal and ensure linkages to Women and Climate Security.
- Submit proof of legal status for the main organization.
- Ensure all proposal sections are complete.
- Do not exceed the maximum budget for each type of funding.
- Ensure geographic scope is limited to **Bangladesh** with a geographical focus only in: Cox's Bazar (Teknaf, Ukhiya and Cox's Bazar Sadar subdistricts), Bandarban, Bhola, Chattagram, Comilla, Feni, Jamalpur, Khulna, Kurigram, Noakhali, Satkhira, Sirajganj, Sunamganj, and Sylhet.
- Project duration should not exceed 24 months.
- Use the correct proposal template based on the impact and funding type requested.
- **To be considered:** If an organization (lead applicant or co–implementing partner) is receiving institutional funding from WPHF, you can apply for programmatic funding as part of this call for proposal. Likewise, if an organization (lead applicant or co-implementing partner) is currently receiving programmatic funding from WPHF, you are eligible to apply for institutional funding as part of this call for proposal.
- Organizations (lead applicant or co-implementing partners) who are currently receiving programmatic and/or institutional funding from WPHF must ensure their current project will be closed prior to receiving funding as part of this call for proposal, i.e. organizations cannot be double funded. If a CSO has a Partnership Agreement with UN Women which is not funded by WPHF, you can apply.

## Key Points to Remember After Applying



#### What to Expect During the Selection Process?

- **Longlisting and Shortlisting:** The first step in the selection process assesses whether your proposal meets the minimum criteria. Applicants who meet these requirements will move to the next stage for a technical review.
- > Selection by the National Steering Committee (NSC): All shortlisted proposals are presented to the NSC, which will review and approve the project selection. Only selected CSOs will be notified by UN Women
- > Proposal and Budget Finalization: UN Women will work with the selected CSOs to finalize their work plans and budgets.
- > Grants Awarded to Partners: As the managing entity, UN Women will conduct a capacity assessment based on risk to initiate a partnership agreement with the selected CSOs.
